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Course Description

Welcome to World History! This course focuses on understanding various cultures around the world and how they have changed over time. Students can expect to learn about the Middle East, Africa, Europe, and additional regions. We will cover how different regions have interacted with one another over time. Students will learn about culture, science, religion, art, and more about the various regions and the lasting impact they leave on us today. Students will engage in skill-based work, essays, exams, group work, projects, and discussions. This course will include discussion and students are expected to share their viewpoints and listen to others in a civil manner.

Learning Objectives

- Discuss the impact of changes involving scientific, intellectual, and religious concepts in various regions of the world.
- Explain different points of view on the same historical event, using data gathered from various sources.
- Analyze examples of ongoing change within and across cultures, such as the rise of nation-states and social and political revolutions.
- Explain the origins, central ideas, and global influence of religions.
- Describe the purpose and effects of treaties, alliances, and international organizations that characterize today's interconnected world.
- Identify major works of art and literature produced in the world and explain how they reflect the era in which they were created.
- Analyze the effects of changes caused by technology, industrialization, urbanization, and population growth.
- Analyze sources to develop a claim and support it with relevant and timely material.


